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

### Introduction

The Missa Aedes Christi (Mass for the House of Christ) was commissioned by Stephen Darlington for the Choir of Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford, with funds provided by the JPT Family Trust and the Friends of Christ Church Cathedral.

The composer chosen for this commission was Francis Grier, who was Assistant Organist and then Organist at the Cathedral between 1976 – 1985.

### A note from the Composer

I was thrilled when Stephen Darlington asked me to set a Mass for the choir of Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford, and even more so when it became clear that the Mass was to be accompanied by liturgical dance, performed by the students of the Rambert Dance School.

My nine years as Assistant Organist and then Organist of the Cathedral were one of the most important formative periods of my musical life. I grew to love the place and its musical tradition, and one of the high points of every week was the celebration of the Mass, usually to some of the great 16th-century English or Italian settings, perhaps by Byrd or Palestrina. I particularly loved to perform the music of John Taverner, the first organist of the Cathedral in 1526. We sang two of his soaring pre-Reformation Mass settings, wonderful musical and religious vehicles of passionate adoration and contemplation.

My new Mass-setting is quite consciously written with these settings in mind and with the memories of participating in the music of many Sung Eucharists in the Cathedral. It is an attempt both to evoke this distant, early Tudor past and also to rekindle something of the same devotional intensity in the 21st century.

### A note from Stephen Darlington

It seems to me to be essential that a liturgical choir such as ours should foster new sacred music which will become the repertoire of the future. The fact that the composer, Francis Grier, has close connections with Christ Church might have been sufficient reason in itself, but he has a particular empathy with this ongoing tradition and he was an obvious choice when we were thinking of a new commission

The special opportunity to work with the dancers from the Rambert School of Ballet and Contemporary Dance has proved stimulating for both composer and musicians. Francis's music is powerful and reflective and is perfectly matched to the physical presence of the dance. Before seeing the piece, it already seemed to me to be an unbeatable combination. This has been more than borne out by the reality of the work which combines these two great art forms in the service of worship with outstanding skill and sensitivity.

### Moving Visions

Moving Visions is the Research Company of the Rambert School of Ballet and Contemporary Dance. We proceed on the basis of the hypothetical notions that;

- dance is potentially and naturally a sacred act,
- that there is a distinct category of experience that can be called the sacred, numinous or the holy,
- that this category of experience might provide, and is characterised by, a sense of metaphysical meaning,
- that dance might provide the basis or core activity of a numinous practice,
- that if numinous experience can be generated in this way within performer it might be made visible and so become such a practice for witnesses also.

### **BIOGRAPHIES**

Christ Church Cathedral Choir is justly famous for the youthfulness of its sound and its daring and adventurous musical programming. Unique in the world as both Cathedral and College choir, the intimate acoustic of its musical home, Oxford's 12th-century Cathedral, has given the choir a relationship with early sacred music and the rhythm and vigour of contemporary idioms which is second to none.

Under the direction of Stephen Darlington, the choir has performed in large venues throughout the world from Sydney to Rio de Janiero, from Tokyo to New York, from Helsinki to Paris. Stephen Darlington, Director of Music for the last 27 years, also engages the choir in challenging collaborative initiatives in the UK and internationally. On recent tours, in addition to performing its own programmes, the choir has worked intensively alongside local community choirs in Portugal, Jamaica, Bermuda and the USA, culminating in successful and memorable joint concerts.

Christ Church Cathedral Choir boasts a lasting legacy of ground-breaking recordings which have excited the critics and the listening public over the last thirty years. The astonishing versatility of this choir has also given them a strong media profile, featuring in more than fifteen documentaries in the last ten years including a number of Howard Goodall's award-winning TV series. The Cathedral continues frequent radio broadcasting of Evensong and other key concerts and services. And of course, the choir is heard regularly singing the Mr Bean and Vicar of Dibley theme tunes on TV, in addition to other incidental music for TV dramas and films. Stephen Darlington is one of the country's leading choral conductors. He has been Director of Music and Tutor in Music at Christ Church since 1985. Previously he was Master of the Music at St. Alban's Abbey and artistic director of the world-famous International Organ Festival. He has established Christ Church as an acknowledged centre of academic musical excellence, and maintained the highest choral traditions of the Church of England in the Cathedral. He is renowned for his direction of choral music of the 16th century, and of modern sacred music, with an extensive discography including several award-winning recordings.

Stephen has travelled worldwide with the choir, performing with many great artists including Placido Domingo, Jose Carreras, James Bowman, Paul Whelan and John-Mark Ainsley. He has collaborated with distinguished contemporary composers such as Judith Weir, John Tavener and Howard Goodall. Until recently Stephen was President of the Royal College of Organists and he is currently Choragus of the University of Oxford and the holder of a Lambeth Doctorate.

Francis Grier was Assistant Organist and then Organist at Christ Church Cathedral between 1976 – 1985 and gave the first ever Prom concert given over to a solo performer in 1985. He is now a psychoanalyst and composer. His major new setting of the Passion, to a text by the poet and novelist Elizabeth Cook, commissioned by the BBC and VocalEssence, was performed in Minneapolis in March 2006. The Minneapolis Star Tribune described the work as: a modern masterpiece. When it was performed in King's College Chapel, Cambridge, the Independent wrote: ... it's a humdinger of a new work. ... Overall, *The Passion of Jesus of Nazareth* is a work of vital attack, shivering beauty and compelling power ..

Francis has written two Masses for St Paul's Cathedral, London: in 2010, the *Missa Spiritus Sanctus* for soloists, choir and instrument ensemble; in 2011, the *Missa Brevis* for choir and organ, for which he received a British Composer Award in 2012.

In 2011, he also wrote *A Sequence for St Davids* for cellist Natalie Clein, soprano Natalie Clifton–Griffith and the choir of St Davids Cathedral for the St Davids Festival. He was commissioned to write a new work for the *Choirbook for the Queen* which was performed in Glasgow Cathedral for the formal Jubilee Thanksgiving visit of the Queen to the city on 4th July 2012. The award–winning London–based choir, Pegasus, commissioned and premiered two new works in September 2012 and the choir of King's College Cambridge will be performing his new setting of the Vespers in the near future. The *Missa Aedes Christi* was commissioned by Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford, for performance in June 2013.

Ross McKim is the Principal and Artistic Director of the Rambert School of Ballet and Contemporary Dance. He entered The Royal Ballet School in 1965 at the age of sixteen. Judged first in his class at the end of his first term he was taken into The Royal Danish Ballet by the end of what would have been his second. He then danced with The Royal Danish Ballet, The National Ballet of Canada and London Contemporary Dance Theatre as a principal dancer before performing for his own companies. He founded Moving Visions in London in 1976. It was later known as English Dance Theatre while based in the north of England. He set up Chamber Dance Theatre in Canada and moved it back to London. In 1985, he was appointed Director of Rambert School and re-established Moving Visions as a research vehicle. He has taught for all the major London professional schools and many companies including Rambert Dance Company, London Contemporary Dance Theatre and Phoenix Dance Theatre. He has choreographed for contemporary dance companies (including London Contemporary Dance Theatre), ballet companies (including The National Ballet of Canada), opera (including English National Opera), theatre companies (including the Tyne Wear Theatre Company) as well as schools, youth groups and puppets.

The Cathedral Dance Research Project is the principal Research Project of Rambert School and is closely related to the MA Degree Programme.

The work revolves around a theory concerned with numinous experience and expression through dance. This theory proposes that dance may potentially be naturally numinous. The dances made through the project attempt to realise this potentiality through two means:

- The act of dance itself
- The taking on of mythic archetypal roles

Since the project is trying to move away from performance and towards rituals the works made are called 'pararituals'.

Moving Visions Dance Theatre, as the research vehicle of the project, has toured to cathedrals and churches all over the UK. The company has also performed in churches in Canada and the United states.

Music for the pararituals is created and performed live by Barry Ganberg and sometimes other musicians. The dancers are students, or former students, of Rambert School. Choreography is by Ross McKim. This is the first time that the dancers have performed with a live unaccompanied choir.




